Sport

Netball

The netball teams competed in an intense schedule of fixtures, demonstrating marked improvement in skill and coordination. The standout fixture of the term was against St John's, where GHS won 6 out of 7 matches, including a thrilling one-point victory by the First Team. The performance reflected the depth of talent and the dedicated coaching within the netball programme.

Societies' News



Envirocare

The Envirocare Society looked forward to the cooler months as an opportunity to revive the vegetable garden. The committee engaged with its members in discussions about various planting techniques and considered the potential offered by windowsill gardening.

As in previous terms, members participated enthusiastically in weekly quizzes, which provided ongoing education about environmental issues and ways to make a positive impact in their daily lives. The society continued to explore partnerships with local environmental organisations with the aim of contributing meaningfully to the community.

Quantum Computing

The learners demonstrated great perseverance and creativity and look forward to seeing the results of their hard work.

Robotics and Coding

Although this term was shorter than usual, the Robotics and Coding Society remained focused and enthusiastic. Despite limited time for major projects, the learners made meaningful progress on their learning journey.

The group began exploring the possibility of entering the IEEE Solid State Arduino Competition. They engaged with online tutorials, which offered valuable insights into the use of Arduino and the fundamentals of writing code for the platform. These tutorials enhanced their technical knowledge and sparked further interest in practical applications.

After careful consideration, the society opted not to participate in the competition this term, choosing instead to prioritise their academic commitments and upcoming examinations. Nevertheless, their involvement proved beneficial, equipping members with new coding and robotics skills they hope to apply in the future, potentially through an internal project or fun competition next term.

Despite the constraints of a shorter term, the society remained curious and committed. It was encouraging to witness the continued growth of their passion for robotics and coding.

Gospel Choir

Additionally, the society assisted a young mother and her four children who had lost their possessions in a house fire, by providing boxes of old clothing.

Several members also volunteered at the Marian Villa Home fete, serving tea, coffee, and cupcakes on a chilly Saturday morning, helping to create a warm atmosphere. Through these efforts, the Interact Society continues to demonstrate its commitment to compassion and community service.
