From the Principal's desk

As we approach the close of this busy and memorable third term, I'd like to pause for a moment and reflect on the breadth of life at Pietermaritzburg Girls' High School. The rhythm of a term is often so fast and full that we hardly take time to step back and marvel at what has been achieved together. This has been a term to remember — especially for a newcomer to GHS, like me – one in which (I'd like to think) tradition, innovation, celebration and hard work have all sat side by side in a way that only the mighty 'Green Machine' of GHS can achieve.

In the academic sphere, our girls have once again distinguished themselves. GHS teams and individuals excelled in a range of Olympiads, debating competitions, inter-school quizzes, and the like, consistently placing among the top performers – including in the Eskom Young Scientist Competition and even the International Astronomy and Astrophysics Competition! Their successes are not measured only in medals and certificates, but in the critical thinking and intellectual curiosity that such endeavours inspire. These achievements affirm what we know to be true: that GHS girls are not only dynamic on the sports field and stage, but also thoughtful scholars, well-equipped to contribute to the conversations and challenges of the future.

Speaking as a history enthusiast, two anniversaries this term were special: the 105th anniversary of our founding, and, the very next day, the centenary of our beloved red-brick school building, opened on 5 August 1925. To the very day, we honoured those sturdy walls that have sheltered generations of GHS girls. Alongside these milestones, our Reunion Day held a few days' earlier was nothing short of magnificent, with nearly 400 Old Girls filling the Sylvia Vietzen Community Centre with warmth, laughter and heartfelt stories of their GHS journeys.



On the fashion front, the school's social calendar has been alive with colour and energy. Our Grade 11 Season's Ball at the Golden Horse Casino was a magnificent occasion — elegant, spirited and a true celebration of GHS style. Equally inspiring was the Matric Art Exhibition in the McDowall Centre – an event that offered a showcase of our girls' creativity, depth and originality, reminding us once again of the extraordinary talent within these walls.

On the sporting front, history was recently made with the official launch of rugby at GHS, building on the success of the rugby clinic at Hilton College, which saw over 80 of our girls take part with enthusiasm and pride. Of course, the growing success and prominence of the national ladies' team offered an obvious inspiration. Next up – I am eyeing the introduction of pickleball on our renewed tennis courts! Basketball once again brought us glory, with our First Team surging to victory at the Val Fowler Tournament, reclaiming the title for the first time in five years. Our spirited derby day against Westville Girls' High School and growing commitment to new sporting codes tell us that the GHS sports story is one of both tradition and bold new beginnings.

Spirit, of course, is never in short supply at GHS. The girls threw themselves wholeheartedly into Spirit Week, lifting morale across the campus and showing that 'cheerfulness with industry' are alive and well at our school. For example, in the staffroom, the 'Anything but a Bag' challenge was won by the ever-creative Mr Reddy, who on that day brought his lunchbox to school in a microwave! It is that same spirit which fuels our commitment to growing opportunities: the rolling out of boarding scholarships this term marks an important step forward, broadening access to a GHS education, with, hopefully, more to come from 2026 onwards. The Old Girls' Guild is also enjoying a resurgence, and a get-together at the Wanderers' Club in Sandton will be taking place on Saturday, 25 October – no doubt with many more such events to follow.

Our Old Girls continue to inspire. This term we welcomed Bhavna Nunthkuma (Class of 2012), Anele Ndlovu (Class of 2003), Leanne Pechey, née Hughes (Class of 1986) and Nicola Channing-Pearce (Class of 1986) — each one a reminder of the diverse and remarkable paths that begin at GHS. On 23 October, we look forward to hosting the acclaimed conversation strategist, Nozipho Tshabalala, née Mbanjwa (Class of 2005), in the Media Centre, for the official launch in KZN of her book, *After the Fires*.

Our 'Orchestra from Scratch' concert provided a joyful opportunity for our girls to play alongside other local musicians, ranging in age from 9 to 99 years old. Dozens of our young musicians earned acclaim in the national Eisteddfod, while the upcoming visit of Marissa Groenewald, rope-running world record holder, to our Sports and Cultural Awards Ceremony promises to end the term on a high note.







We also celebrated Women's Month in true GHS fashion: with style, fun and reflection. From make-up sessions and fashion shows, to style tips from Edgars and even full-body massages for our female staff, it was a month of acknowledging and celebrating the important roles of women. Meanwhile, the male staff met over coffee to reflect on our responsibilities as men working in an all-girls' school — a small but significant step in building understanding and shared purpose.

Campus life has been refreshed in other ways, too. The opening of the Coffee Box trailer overlooking the Shelagh Bowness Astroturf has given staff and girls alike a new hub of connection. The long-awaited repairs to the Bev Shuttleworth swimming pool are complete and the pool is at last filled up and ready for use. We are proud, too, to unveil a redesigned school website, a modern reflection of our vibrant and evolving community.

Most importantly, there is a palpable sense of renewed energy and interest in GHS. Over 600 visitors attended our recent information session aimed at 2027 entrants to GHS, and our stated commitment for the future is to improve everything we do — from classrooms to the boarding establishment, from processes to facilities. We are asking bold questions, such as: 'Why do we do things this way? Could there be a better way?' We are committed to finding creative avenues to raise funds and to exploring new learning opportunities for our young ladies.

In short, this has been a term of celebration, reflection and forward momentum. As we head into the final stretch of the year, I want to thank our girls for their enthusiasm, our parents for their continued support, our Old Girls for their loyalty, and our staff for their professionalism and dedication to the school. Together, we are shaping not just a school, but a living tradition — one that honours its past while striving boldly for the future.

Societies' News

Envirocare

The Green Elly


